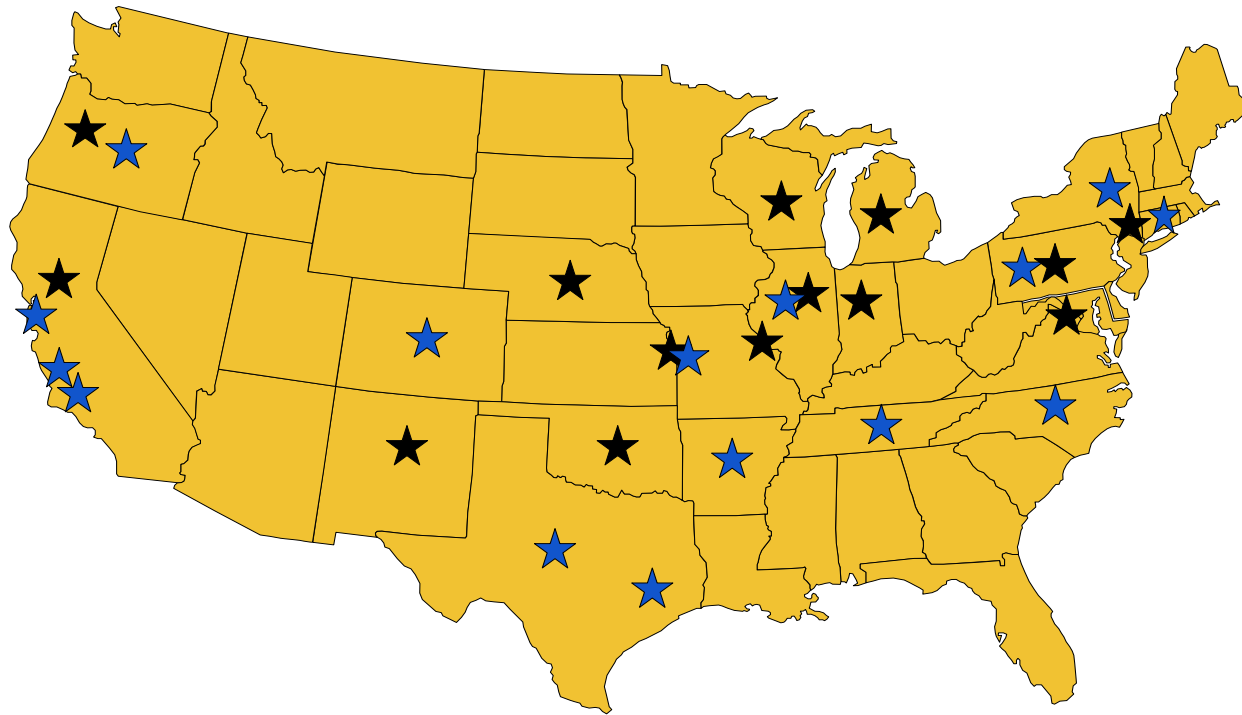


Regional Collaboration Efforts for Effective Implementation across the U.S. – Map and Activity Chart

Regional coordination exists when there is intentional partnership and engagement across organizations and sectors in effort to enhance capacity and structure for effective implementation of administrative relief, immigration services and preparing for eventual immigration reform. Organizations and funding collaborates across the country have been building regional coordination tables and partnerships which serve as models for organizations that are new to this effort. Below is a map of where the Regional Training Team of the Committee for Immigration Reform Implementation (CIRI) has identified regional collaboration efforts through conversation with organizations. **Black** stars are the “Regional Coordination Collaboratives” and **blue** stars are “Regional Funding Collaboratives” which are explained in the activity chart.
